Call to Conversion and Vocation by Susai Jesu, OMI. Jesus proclaims conversion, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent and believe in the Gospel." Jesus calls his first apostles, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of people." These two moments of conversion and vocation have a determining importance in the life of every Christian. The whole purpose of life and salvation develops inwardly in every Christian. Read the reflection here.

## **3RD SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME**

Excerpt from a homily by Fr. Carl Kelly, OMI

For the next six Sundays, we will be reading selections from the Gospel according to Mark. Mark was the first Gospel to be written. He wrote his Gospel because there were problems facing the Christians at the time. There were a great number of stories circulating about the life and teachings of Jesus, and some of them were leading people into error. For example, because of the stories of Jesus' miracles, some believed that he was a magician. Mark wanted to show that Jesus was truly a man, who was the Son of God. For Mark, the events of Christ's life lead him to suffering, and to death and eventually to the Resurrection. If one wanted to follow Jesus, one would also be lead to suffering and death. The early Christians needed to know that repentance and conversion were the keys to successfully imitating and following Jesus. Today's passage comes from the beginning of Mark's Gospel, and tells us of the call of the first of his followers. They were Andrew, Peter, James and John. Jesus's first words as recorded by Mark were: "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe in the Good News." I would like to take a few moments to reflect on repentance. In order to repent, we must realize that something is wrong, that we are not what we could be. We can glimpse a better future, and we still don't move. We realize that the road forward is long and the process is slow, difficult and painful. The hardest people of all to convert are those who feel they are good. They see no need for conversion. Good people cannot hear the Good News. It is only the sinners who long for the good news and those are the ones who can receive it with joy. We know there is little point in warning or threatening. But if you can show me what I'm missing, what I lack, in order that my life may be fuller, then you might disturb me enough to be moved to take whatever action is necessary. This approach makes me feel as if I am being offered a gift. There are some who respond to the call immediately. That was what happened in the first reading, when Jonah began to preach to the inhabitants of Nineveh. All that was needed was a flash of insight or a moment of enlightenment. When dissatisfaction has grown to such a point that it becomes painful, when we are travelling down the wrong paths, when we are ready, we tend to answer immediately to the call to conversion. In today's Gospel, the disciples fishing with their father

appeared to have been ripe for conversion. It seems unreal,

it was so sudden. The apostles must have been secretly longing for it. Life had prepared them for it, as hunger

prepares a person to enjoy a banquet. To call people to conversion before they are ready is generally a waste. There is a moment of readiness. We cannot see what we are not ready to see, or hear what we are not ready to hear. To be unready is to be unable to respond properly. Andrew, Peter, James and John and the inhabitants of the city of Nineveh seem to have been ready. Christ did not order or command the apostles. He invited. Jesus continues to do the same today. There have been many times in my life when I have been faced with a challenge to grow spiritually with Jesus Christ. I knew what I had to do, and yet there was a fear there. What would happen if I really did change? What would happen if I took Jesus seriously at what he was calling me to do or to be? We are always called to become more authentically what we truly are. I was in France a few years back taking a course dealing with the spirituality of Eugene de Mazenod, the founder of the Oblates. I came across a little poem by Sister Margaret Halaska, O.S.F. called *Covenant*. Let me share it with you.

#### Covenant

God knocks at my door seeking a home for his son.

Rent is cheap, I say.

I don't want to rent. I want to buy, says God.

I'm not sure I want to sell, but you might come in and look around.

I think I will, says God.

I might let you have a room or two.

I like it, says God. I'll take the two. You might decide to give me more some day. I can wait, says God.

I'd like to give you more, but it's a bit difficult. I need some space for me.

I know, says God, but I'll wait. I like what I see.

Hm, maybe I can let you have another room.
I really don't need that much.

Thanks, says God, I'll take it. I like what I see.

I'd like to give you the whole house but I'm not sure ...

Think on it, says God. I wouldn't put you out. Your house would be mine and my son would live in it. You'd have more space than you'd ever had before.

I don't understand at all.

I know, says God, but I can't tell you about that.
You'll have to discover it for yourself.

That can only happen if you let me have the whole house.

A bit risky, I say.

Yes, says God, but try me.

I'm not sure – I'll let you know.

I can wait, says God, I like what I see.
