5TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

Excerpt from a homily by Fr. Carl Kelly, OMI

After Jesus had spent the day healing people, he went off by himself to pray. When the Apostles found him they said: "Everyone is searching for you." He answered, "Let us go in the neighbouring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do." Paul tells us of his proclaiming of the Gospel, and that it was an obligation placed on him.

First a story: a small town decided to have an auction to raise money for a community centre. The townsfolk looked through their homes, and managed to gather a collection of trinkets, furniture and other slightly more valuable items. On the day of the auction things proceeded quite well, several thousand dollars had been raised by the time the last item was brought forward: an old violin coated with dust and grime. "What do you bid for it?", asked the auctioneer, There was only silence. "Come on," he persisted, "say something". Finally someone yelled out, "fifty cents", and everyone laughed. Then a man came to the front and asked to see the violin. He took it, tuned it, and began to play. Its beautiful sound filled the room. When he finished, he handed the violin back to the auctioneer and walked away. The auctioneer called out again. So the bids went on "\$200! \$300! \$400!". In his travels, the Apostle Paul endured beatings, imprisonment, and misunderstanding. Everywhere Paul went he shared the good news of Jesus Christ. And as he presented the Gospel in each place and to each person or group, he strove to be understood, he altered his behaviour and his manners so that the message would be more easily heard. Paul describes it: "Though I am free and belong to no man, I make myself a slave to everyone, to win as many to Christ as possible. To the Jews, I became like a Jew to win the Jews. To the weak, I became weak to win the weak. I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some."

While Paul's calling was a special one, the essence of his calling is not special at all. We, like Paul, are called to share the good news of Jesus Christ who has affected our lives. Unfortunately many Christians have no zeal for this task. Some think that it is inappropriate to tell others about Christ. While others avoid their calling by saying that faith is a private matter. What is wrong with us that we are so reluctant to witness to others about the good news which we believe in?

We often ask why are there so few people coming to Christ? Why is there so much apathy about God in the world? Some of the answers are found out in the world: people are attracted to the gods of money and success, others are caught up by the demons of ignorance and fear, but some of the answers to the questions we ask about the church lie within us. So little is happening in so many of our churches because we are saying so little about our Saviour. Have you ever told anyone the good news of Jesus Christ? Remember the violin? Dusty, dirty, old, it was worth only fifty cents until it was played. Then it was worth hundreds of dollars. Would you have the church grow? Would you have society become a better place? Would you have others discover healing and wholeness for their lives? Allow yourself to be played by the master. Allow Christ to penetrate ever deeper into your lives. Wait upon God, search for God, listen for God, walk with him and talk with him, and God will walk and talk with you. God will make the difference in your lives, and you will want to pass that difference, and the reason for it, onward. People want something in their lives that is better than what they have. They want God to touch them as they see God has touched others.
