THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD Excerpt from a homily by Fr. Carl Kelly, OMI

In 1979, an Englishman, Kit Williams wrote a children's story, called "Masquerade". It was about three animals who set out to find their way to the sun. It was an interesting little book, but not enough to make it the popular bestseller it became. Over 2 million copies were sold worldwide. Not because of the story, but because of the paintings that were in the book. These paintings had clues to the exact location of a fabulous piece of jewelry in the shape of a golden hare. It was encrusted with diamonds and rubies and other precious stones. It was a valuable piece of jewelry. The pictures told people where the treasure was to be found. If you found the golden hare, it was yours to keep. It was a fascinating challenge for millions of people from all over the world. They went to England armed with metal detectors, shovels and rakes and began to dig up cemeteries, gardens even backyards, convinced they had the clues to the discovery of the golden hare.

Just over three years later, a man put together all the clues found in the paintings which had to be studied with wit, wisdom and intelligence to come up with the exact location. He found the treasure by putting together the clues. The paintings were brilliant, the detective work in solving the puzzles was masterful, and the reward was well worth the expense.

Today's Gospel tells of another search and happy conclusion. In the Gospels, the treasure is not a piece of jewelry, but a person, a child with his mother. The story of the discovery by the wise men is a story of searching through the Hebrew Scriptures, their own folklore and the stars in the sky for the clues. Everything led them to Bethlehem and there they found the child with his mother, Mary.

All the people we have met in the Gospel stories connected with the birth of Jesus either followed the clues given to them, or chose to ignore them. Joseph, Mary, the shepherds, they all discovered Jesus. Herod, the scribes, chief priests, they all tried to kill Jesus. Each person reacted to the signs they saw: some saw a threat, others saw a saviour.

Today we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany, a Greek word meaning manifestation or revelation. God revealed himself, this time not to just the chosen people, but to all the world.

The first reading from Isaiah gives the historical background and perspective. It tells the people that kings and their followers would come from all over the world

to worship the one true God. God has made himself known to people of goodwill from any place, any race, any background. Anyone who is willing to search and accept what they find. In order to discover Jesus, the wise men had to use their knowledge, goodwill, perseverance and courage. That is true today, as well. Some find Christ; others, like Herod, are afraid that if they find Christ, their lives will be changed or threatened.

Today's Gospel has another lesson for us. The three wise men brought gifts which corresponded to what they believed the child was. They brought gold, which said he was a king. They brought incense, he was to be worshiped. They brought myrrh, an ointment used in embalming a dead body: he would die. They saw the child as a king who was God, who would die for his people. Years later, in one of the turning points of his public life, Jesus asked his disciples: "Who do you say I am?" Peter's answer was: "You are Christ, the Lord." The Christmas story calls on each of us to answer the same question. For the shepherds, who did they say he was, and what did they do? The wise men from the East came as described in today's Gospel. The wise men from Jerusalem didn't even look. They had the information, and they gave it away. The wise men, using the science of the day and their knowledge of Scripture found Jesus. The scribes did not.

Today's feast reminds us that God continues to reveal himself. Some discover him, others do not. With today's Mass, we come to the end of the Christmas story. The story has been told in parts over the last few weeks. We are invited to reflect on the meaning of Christmas. Not just the stories, but the meaning behind the stories. Like the clues in the children's story, "Masquerade", there are real clues, and there is real treasure to be found. God continues to reveal himself to us. He is still to be found. And the gifts we bring tell what we believe Jesus, the Christ, is to be for us.
