# FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Excerpt from a homily by Fr. Carl Kelly, OMI

Light is an image that shows up in both the first reading and the Gospel. This image is used to tell us how essential we are and how necessary our witness is to God's glory and to the world. In the first reading, Isaiah tells the people how they are to act towards others. It matters less what they say they believe, because how they act makes a much more powerful statement. The people had been in exile for many years and they have just returned to their native land. While they were in exile, they had suffered terribly. They came back inspired by the promises made to them that if they returned and were faithful, God would bless them. What they found out was that reality did not live up to the promises. They celebrated the big feast days. They took part in the important and required fasts. But the glory of God did not seem any more apparent. Their neighbours did not follow their example and come to worship their God. They complained to the prophet and he told them if they wanted their religious acts to be worth anything at all, they were to share their food with the hungry. They were to bring the homeless to live with them. They were to share their clothes with the naked. They were not to turn away from their own people. Don't quit praying, but reach out to others. That was the way their light would shine; that was how their hurt would be healed over. "Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say 'Here I am'." (Isaiah 58:8-12) These words were said to the people because they had observed something each of us has discovered in our own lives at one time or another: we go to church, we perform our religious acts and they seem not to make any difference at all. Nothing changes. So the prophet tells them how to live their religion in such a way that it will make a difference. Feed the hungry. Shelter the homeless and poor. Clothe the naked, do not turn away from your own people. There is an incident related by James Stephen Behrens that illustrates the way that our light can be brought to others: "Eddy was a friendly, big and simple man. He owned a diner that I used to visit a lot. The diner was what is called a railroad car diner. Eddy always gave me a second and even third cup of coffee for free." "No charge there, no charge at all. You just come back real soon," he would say. And I always did. I knew he had

not had an easy life, but it was a very good one. He never knew that I knew he sponsored young people from Poland. He got them over to United States, he got places for them to live and jobs, he made sure they got to church, and put them through school. I do not think he ever married, but he sure took care of a lot of kids. One day, I was watching TV. An ad came on for some kind of a cleanser. The ad featured a vaguely familiar diner and suddenly Eddy's face appeared on the screen, beaming as he wiped the counter with the cleanser. When I saw him again, I told him I saw him on TV and he laughed and said, "You ain't seen nothin' yet." Now the diner was to appear in a film starring Robert De Niro. Indeed, several weeks later, the diner and surrounding area was turned into a scene out of the 1930s. Things soon turned back to normal, and stayed that way for a while, until a wealthy German offered Eddy a lot of money for the diner. Eddy sold it, and the diner was crated and shipped off to Germany. Eddy retired and died a few years later. Jesus told his disciples to enter the world with no possessions. I took a walk last night and wondered what it means to go into the world with nothing in your pockets, no gold or silver. There is a lot of goodness in life, a lot of people like Eddy. Maybe something of God is given in and through all those second cups of coffee, the kind you can never buy but only receive. And so we come back, and we learn that the best things in life are given away. That is one way in which our light can and does shine. Jesus told us: "In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)
